DR. FRANKLIN B. CARVER

For the past two years, Dr. Carver has served as Interim Director of the School of Health Sciences at Ohio University, which is located in Athens, Ohio. He has also served as Coordinator and Tenured Professor of the Environmental Health Science Program at Ohio University for over eight years. He is an Environmental Health Officer in the U.S. Navy Reserves, holding the rank of Commander. Dr. Carver earned a Bachelor's Degree in Health Education from Fayetteville State University, a Master of Science in Environmental Health from East Tennessee State University, and a Doctorate from Ohio University. Dr. Carver has over 23 years of experience in the Environmental Health field, including having worked in industry as an Environmental Health and Safety Supervisor for over three years, and in environmental health in Liberia, West Africa, for more than four years. He has also taught courses and directed programs in environmental health at the University of Liberia, Mississippi Valley State University, and Western Carolina University.

Dr. Carver is an active member of the National Environmental Health Association, the National Association of Environmental Professionals, the American Public Health Association, and several other national and state professional organizations, including the Ohio Environmental Health Association. He has completed over six years of service as councilman on the National Environmental Health Science and Protection Accreditation Council. He is currently on the Board of Directors for the American Academy of Sanitarians and is Technical Editor of the *JOURNAL OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH*. Dr. Carver at present has over fifty publications and presentations in his areas of research, which include: (1) Minority Concerns In Environmental Health; (2) Environmental Health Issues in Developing Countries and Rural America; and (3) Curriculum Development and Manpower Needs In Environmental Health.

Dr. Carver has been invited to the White House and honored by President and Mrs. Clinton as a result of having been selected Campus Liason Officer (CLO) of the Year in recognition of his achievements in recruiting qualified candidates in the health professions to serve in the United States Navy.
